

More philanthropy on way across Toledo, region

RUNNING for a cure can make a big difference. **Ernie Lewis** of Toledo is "kicking cancer's [butt]" one mile at a time. In 10 years, he has raised nearly \$60,000 for research and patient care. People donate for Ernie to run in the name of loved ones. This year, he plans to complete the Iron Man Wisconsin on Sept. 10 with his friend **Mia Leone**, who recently finished chemo treatments for breast cancer.

THE Lambie Guyton Stout legacy lives on. She started Cocktails for a Cause in her backyard to raise awareness and funds to end breast cancer. While she lost her battle five years ago, her family and friends gather each year to support her cause. The seventh event, held at Carranor Hunt and Polo Club, raised \$43,000 to benefit the Margaret Lamb Guyton Stout Fund at Toledo Community Foundation for genetic testing, health awareness, research, patient support, and free mammograms. Sales of Comfort Crunch, a healthy snack made by Lambie's mom, **Priscilla Lamb Schwier**, also raises money for the cause.

Emcee **Lissa Guyton**, of WTVG-TV, Channel 13, led the evening. Ms. Guyton is Lambie's sister.

Honorary chairman **Kerry Wellstein** shared her story of having a gene mutation that put her at risk for breast and/or ovarian cancer. Other speakers included Dr. **Helen Mabry**, a breast surgical oncologist, and **Kelly Morse**, a cancer genetic counselor.
